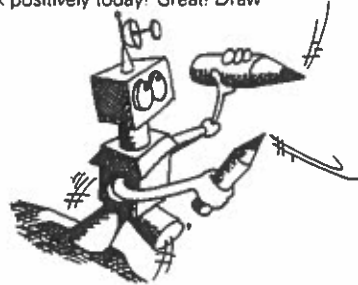
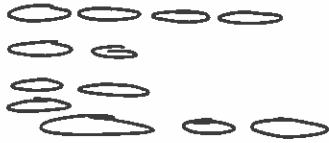


# LESSON 13

## Warm-up

## Key Drawing Word: Intermediate Shading

**SHADE, SHADOW & SHADING:** Have you ever sat under a tree on a hot, bright, sunny day? Why did you sit there? More than likely you sat there to be in the **shade**—to get out of the sun—to be in the **shadow** of the tree! Was it darker or lighter in the **shadow** under the tree? Yes! It was darker! Why was it darker? Because the sunlight was partially blocked by the shape of the tree. If you were drawing the grass under the tree you would have to draw the **shadow** darker than the grass which is not in the shade. That is what you do when you **shade**. **Shading** is very important to drawing. **Shading** makes shapes and objects you draw look three-dimensional, to have form or volume, and to look more realistic. **Shading** makes what you are drawing look as if you could walk around it, sit under it or climb it. **Shading** is drawing from dark to light or from light to dark to make things look more interesting—to show how the light from the sun, a ceiling light, candlelight or some other light source hits a shape or object.

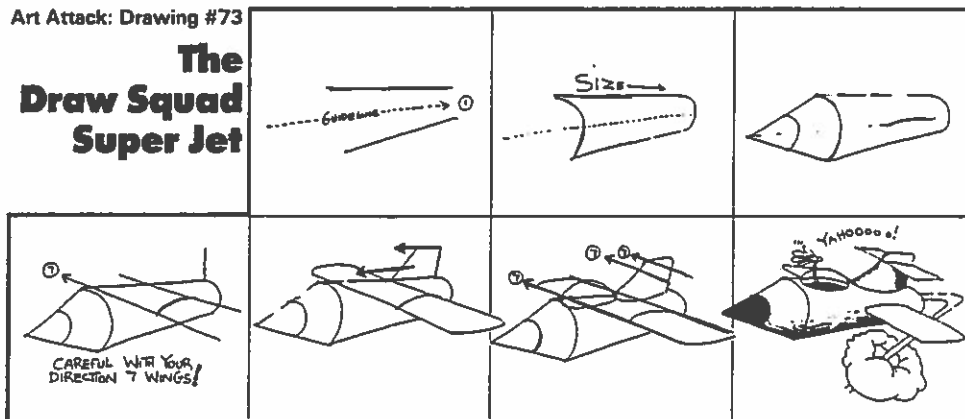
